From Drew's Desk

*"Of course, the Christian should love his or her spouse. They are supposed to love their neighbor, and since one's spouse is one's nearest neighbor, they should be their deepest love. And they should also be a dearest friend."*

— Martin Luther

Three years after writing a paper called "The Estate of Marriage," Martin Luther wed a former nun named Katharina von Bora. "There is a lot to get used to in the first year of marriage," Luther once said, "One wakes up in the morning and finds a pair of pigtales on the pillow which were not there before."

Marriage required the forty-one-year-old Luther to make significant adjustments. Katharina had a strong personality that challenged Luther the introvert. While he was a monk, long periods of solitude had characterized Luther's life. He now needed to share his world with another person.

Financial matters also tested the couple's relationship. In this area, Katharina's resourcefulness compensated for Luther's generosity. Katharina—or "Mr. Katy" as Luther sometimes teased her—successfully ran the household.

For three weeks in March, I was the "observer" at one of Lutheran Congregational Service's "Marriage Preparedness" series, which was held at St. Peter's. Fourteen couples came for the three-part series, and I could see the excitement in their eyes. (Their excitement was more over being engaged than about taking the classes, I'm sure.)

When you hear the word "marriage," what things come to mind? Maybe you think of a wedding dress, a ceremony in a church, or learning to share your personal space. Have you ever thought of marriage as a vocation? A vocation is a "calling" that is good and pleasing to God. Katharina von Bora and Martin Luther both felt that marriage was a way of life that God took delight in.

In Genesis 2:18 God said "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make a helper fit for him." This, for Luther, is the beginning of marriage. Many people choose to remain single, with helpers in the form of friends and family; this, too, can be a healthy vocation.

Still others, members of the GLBT community, feel called to the vocation of marriage -- but are denied that vocation by many members of society.

Marriage brings great joys, but also challenges. The prayers and support of the Christian community are meant to help all people, in whatever vocation they are called to. Luther knew first-hand the blessings of a vocation: "How can the heart have greater good, joy, and delight than in God, when one is certain that his or her estate, conduct, and work are pleasing to God?"

### March Council Highlights

A motion was approved to:

- Appoint Glenn Breindenbach as St. Peter's representative to the Fountain Hill Cemetery Board.
- Appoint Frank Cszaszar to be part of the Sexton Team.
- Disperse funds that were budgeted for CUNA to Habitat for Humanity since St. Peter's is not an active participant in CUNA at this time.
- Adopt a policy on "Sharing Congregational Records" which states: The records of the congregation are for individual inquiries for personal information related to an individual or family. Parish records are generally for internal use (members, synod, church body reports, archives) and not for external use (other religious groups, para-groups, and commercial entities).
- Donate \$1,000.00 from the Ministry Fund to Gurukul Lutheran Theological Seminary in Chennai, India, to support Dora Babu. Dora is a friend of Intern Drew Goodson and is studying to be a Lutheran pastor. Our gift will help defray seminary tuition debts.

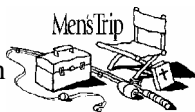

## Pastor Roberts to Be Honored at Seminary Convocation

On June 9, 2007, Pastor Roberts was presented with the Henry Melchior Muhlenberg Medal for exemplary service in congregational and campus ministry in Regions 7 and 8 of the ELCA (an area which includes Pennsylvania, New England, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, and Washington, DC). The medal is an honor conferred by the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and was established in 1992, the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beginning of the ministry of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg (a Lutheran missionary from Saxony, Germany) on the shores of North America. The presentation was made at the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod's first LIFT (Lutherans in Faith Together) Event – a day of learning and celebration following the 2007 Synod Assembly. 29 people represented St. Peter's at that event!



This year, because she was presented this medal, Pastor Roberts has been invited to be a speaker at the annual Spring Convocation at the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia. On April 29, she will be a guest at the Convocation Banquet, where she will share some of her reflections on mission and ministry.

Come one; come all to help build a home in Bethlehem! That's right, Habitat for Humanity and Thrivent Financial for Lutherans have teamed up to build a home in Bethlehem through a project called Thrivent Builds Homes. This program helps provide affordable homes for people who otherwise couldn't afford to own their own house.

Can't swing a hammer? Don't like climbing ladders? NO PROBLEM! With this program, you can help provide meals, welcome the volunteers to the sites, or become a "safety leader." Of course, we also welcome those who are willing to get a little sweaty and dirty building the homes. But why help out? "Building these homes is more than just boards and blocks," suggests the Thrivent Builds Homes pamphlet. These are homes where family members can gather and grow in love. The initial building dates are: May 19-31. This initial building period is known as the "blitz," when the frames and roofs are assembled. You can sign up for any of those dates during the blitz, but St. Peter's will be focusing on these dates: May 27 & 31.

You can sign up for a half day (8 AM-12 Noon or 12 Noon-4 PM) or a whole day (8 AM – 4 PM). We are also asked to help with breakfast and lunch on Wednesday, May 28.
